That Time of the Year

I am announcing my desire to run for Club president for another one-year term! For those who don't know me well, here's a bit of my life in photography...

As a kid, I loved exploring the attic of our house in Far Rockaway, where I came across some old junk in an unused bathroom. It turned out to be some darkroom equipment three colored trays (red, white, and blue), a black plastic tube with crinkled clear plastic strips inside (a developing tank), a metal box with a bulb inside and switches on the outside (a contact printing box), and this tall spindly thing that looked like a cross between something from Frankenstein's laboratory and Dr. Zarkov's space ship (it was an enlarger).

I got hooked. Within days I made my dad buy me a box camera (I didn't have to whine or plead too much). It was a Kodak Brownie that used 127 film—and I was off shooting my first roll. In the next few



weeks I learned how to wind the film on that plastic strip and load it into the tank, all in the dark, pour in chemicals, and wait —that was the most difficult part.

My first contact print was of my dog, Mr. Chips (my mom named him). He was a black-and-white German shepherd, in more ways than one. I carried that image in my wallet for years and years until it stuck to the plastic insert and eventually disintegrated.

This all began when I was eight years old, 70 years ago.

And I'm still at it!

From what I understand, all the members of this year's ExCom have agreed to run for their positions again.

If you're interested in being a Club officer, speak to one of the Nominating Committee members, or ask someone to nominate you from the floor.

[Note—the entry deadlines for most of these activities is two days prior to the event, but the *You Be the Judge* nights have a one month lead time!!!]

- September 9th—Welcome Back What'd you do over the summer ments? Share up to 10 images to tell your story. Entry deadline: September 7th.
- October 14th—My Favorite Image You'll probably have to open up your archives for this assignment. Rack your absolutely favorite image to share. Be prepared to explain the who, what, where, when, why, and how of this photo. Entry deadline: October 12th.



• October 28th—*Theme Night:* (*B&W*) There's more than one way to skin a cat and to change an image to black-and-white. Show us what you can do in monochrome. Limit of 10 images, please. Entry deadline: October 26th.

- November 11th—You Be the Judge (Architecture) You may submit one architectural image that has never before been seen at any Club activities. Johnay be an active building or just a detail shot. Each entry will be scored and commented on by all participating Park West members. Entry deadline: October 15th.
- January 27th—Theme Night: (Street Photography) Share up to 10 of your images that feature chance encounters and random incidents on the street. Entry deadline: January 25th.



• February 10th—Theme Night: (Planes, Trains, and Automobiles) Share up to 10 of your mages where "planes, trains, and/or automobiles" are the main theme. Choose one form of transport or you may mix and match Entry deadline: February 8th.

February 24th—Portfolio Night: (Dealer's Choice) Submit from 6 to 10 images on a theme of your choice (humor, Covid, travel, etc.) Entry deadline: February 22nd.

• March 10th—Interpretations
The Club will provide the base images. The members will alter them in anyway they see fit.
Let your imagination and software skills be limitless.
Entry deadline: March 8th.



- March 24th—You Be the Judge (Food) You may submit one image pertaining to the culinary arts that has hever before been seen at any Club activities. You are only limited by your appetite! Each entry will be scored and commented on by all participating Club members. Entry deadline: February 25th.
- April 14th—*Theme Night:* (*After Dark*) Astrophotography, traffic, street lights—the possibilities are endless—as long as your 10 submissions were shot after the sun has set. Entry deadline: April 11th.

PDI Workshops

Projected Digital Image workshops are held throughout the year—usually on Thursday evenings. There will also be a PDI workshop on Monday, April 28th. All entry deadlines are the previous day.

Year-End Competition

The Year-End Competition will be held on Monday, June 2nd. It's different from our monthly competitions: both the rules of entry and the judging are different.

Each Club member may submit up to four PDIs. But, and this is a big BUT—all the submissions must have been entered into one of the monthly competitions held earlier this year (October through May). It doesn't matter if the images were awarded honors or got a 'C'— they are eligible for this competition. Another

big BUT—images may not be altered from the way they were first entered even if the judge said "that would improve the photo" —it must be the original, unaltered image with the same title (including the original month of entry). Absolutely no changes!!!

The image submission deadline is 11:59 p.m. on Monday, May 19th.

There will be three judges. Each of the judges will score from one to nine points for each image. The scores will be added and the total will be announced. An

image can accumulate from 3 to 27 points. The judges make no comments during the scoring.

There will be one winner (the PDI-of-the-Year) plus four runners-up. If there are tie scores for the PDI-of-the-Year there will be additional votes cast by the judges to determine the winner. If more than four images are tied for runner-up, they will all be declared runners-up.

Due to the uncertainties of Zooming, the judging will be done prior to the June 2nd date. This way we can edit the recording for time and glitches.

Nomination and Election Procedures

We began the Club's yearly election procedures at the March business meeting with appointing the Nominating Committee (Elayne Dix, Richard Gold, and Helen Pine).

They will present their slate of (at least) one nominee for each position on the Executive Committee (president, vice president, treasurer, corresponding/membership secretary, recording secretary, and two membersat-large) to the membership at the last meeting in April.



Any Club member who is interested in running for an office may contact the Nominating Committee of their intent.

After the Nominating Committee's slate has been announced, the floor will be opened to nominations. Any Park West member may nominate any other Club member. Nominations will be accepted from the floor at each Club meeting leading up to, but not including, the May business meeting.

The next phase of the PWCC election process is the election itself. This takes place at the May business meeting. If there is only one nominee for each position, then a motion may be made asking the Club's recording secretary to cast a single unanimous vote for the slate. Should there be more than one nominee for any of the seven positions, then a vote must be taken for that position (those positions). The secretary can still cast the unanimous vote for the unopposed candidates.

Members must be present at the meeting to cast their vote.



Expanding Visions is a photography class being offered this Spring. It is open to members of the Park West Camera Club and all other photographers.

Expanding Visions will be all virtual this year using the Zoom software.

The format of the class is simple: We start with an introductory session where we will discuss equipment, techniques, and the specifics of the course.

For the next four weeks you will work on the four (4) class assignments—one a week. It's up to you to interpret each assignment and shoot your images accordingly. Each Thursday we will go over the images from that week's assignment.

At the final session we will share our photographs from the Term Project, talk about our experiences, and evaluate what, and how well, we did.

The assignments in *Expanding Visions 31* are all based on the ancient Greek elements of earth, water, air, and fire.

Not too complicated, is it? Lots of fun and educational; but most of all, it will expand your vision in the photographs you take, and allow you to grow as a photographer.

ExCom Meeting

Minutes

March 19, 2025 (Via Zoom)

Participating ExCom Members: President Chuck Pine; Vice President Michael Schleiff, Treasurer Joe Nawy; Corres. Secy. Helen Pine; Rec. Secy. Christine Doyle; Members-At-Large Betsy Currier and Jeff Langford

The meeting was called to order at 4 p.m.

The meeting was called to discuss agenda items for the upcoming business meeting on March 31st, as well as other pending topics.

1. Dissolution Clause for Club Constitution: There was further discussion about the proposed dissolution clause for the Club's constitution. Chuck noted that member Jill Griess, an attorney, had discussed the matter with her law firm colleagues. The following was decided: (a) 34 of the members present and voting would trigger a resolution to dissolve the Club; (b) a resolution to dissolve the Club would require a vote of ¾ of the membership to pass; (c) the vote will be conducted by

email, which will create a record of the votes; and (d) following a vote to dissolve the Club, the Club's remaining physical and monetary assets will be donated to a photographyrelated organization. Chuck will prepare a final draft for review by the Executive Committee. It is anticipated that the final draft will be approved and presented to members at the March 31st business meeting for review and consideration, followed by a vote at the May 19th business meeting.

- **2**. *Year-End Competition*: We will be using the same format for the year-end competition in May that we have been using since we switched to Zoom meetings: we will record the judges' scoring of members' images, and then present the recording to the members on June 2nd. The deadline for members to submit their four images is May 19th; the judging will take place on May 28th or 29th. \$50 B&H gift cards will be given as prizes to the winners of the year-end competition and the competition point totals.
- 3. Otto Litzel Memorial Dinner: A few locations for the year-end Otto Litzel Dinner were suggested, including: John's Pizzeria (West 44th



Street, near Times Square); Dallas BBQ (8th Avenue at 23rd Street); Carmine's in the Midtown area; and the Chelsea Piers. This will be discussed at the business meeting. A call for member volunteers to follow up and coordinate the event will be made. Helen suggested moving the date from June 9th to June 16th or 23rd. There were no objections; this will also be raised at the business meeting.

- 4. Print Salon Presentation: Jeff reported on the proposed Print Salon presentation. It was the consensus of members of the Print Salon that putting together a showing of print images would be a heavy burden for an event that may not be well attended. It was suggested instead that the Club look into a gallery show for all members.
- 5. Nominating Committee: A
 Nominating Committee will
 need to be formed at the
 next Business Meeting, to
 coordinate the selection of
 nominees for the 2025-2026
 Club year.

- **6**. *Length of Competition Nights:* Proposals to shorten competition nights by (a) limiting each member to 12 submissions per Club year (as opposed to 16), and (b) limiting each member to one submission each monthly competition, were discussed. It was the consensus that the Club continue to allow each member to submit up to two images in each of the 8 competitions held during the Club year.
- 7. Zoom Recordings on Club Website: Michael noted the growing number of recordings of Club meetings that are now on the Club website, including monthly competitions, guest speakers, and member theme nights. It was agreed that competition recordings will be posted for a month (and taken down when a new competition recording is available); guest speaker recordings will stay on the website for the foreseeable future; and member theme night recordings will be posted for one month. Members' curtain raisers can also be posted on the website. All the recordings will be archived on Michael's YouTube channel.

- 8. Meeting Start Times: At present, club meetings start at 7 p.m., except for competitions, which start at 6:30 p.m. As discussed at previous meetings, it was agreed to resume starting all Club meetings at 6:30 p.m., effective with the new Club year in September.
- 9. Running Club Meeting
 Zooms: It was agreed that
 Helen will continue running
 the meeting Zooms, and
 Michael will be the back-up.
- about training other Club members as back-ups for Club administrative tasks, such as updating the Club website and creating the *Photo Notes* newsletter. Chuck noted that he uses Apple Pages and Adobe Photoshop to create *Photo Notes*, and uses the prior month's issue to create the next month's. No decision was reached.

There being no further items to discuss, the meeting was adjourned at approximately 5:15 p.m.

No matter where you are standing (or sitting) to take a photo—it's the wrong spot!

You have to move around... Get closer to the subject or move farther away!

Move to the left or move to the right!

Get lower to the ground or move higher up!

website is updated weekly, and
that recordings of monthly
competitions, guest speakers/
workshop events, and member
theme nights are now posted
on the website. Co-chair
Michael Schleiff also noted that
competition and member
theme night recordings are
posted for a month, and guest



speaker/workshop recordings are posted permanently (under "Speaker & How-To Videos"). All members were encouraged to register with the website.

Workshop: No report (no chair)

V. Old Business

A. Dissolution Clause for Club Constitution: Chuck reported on the proposed dissolution clause for our Constitution. Its purpose is to establish a format to dissolve the Club, and dispose of its assets, once it is decided that the Club is no longer viable. It was stressed that this is purely an exercise in corporate governance; there are no plans to dissolve the Club at this time.

The draft amendment has three sections: (1) If a majority of the Executive Committee believes the Club is no longer viable, it can approach the Club membership to discuss its dissolution; (2) a motion to dissolve the Club shall be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the membership at a meeting called for the sole purpose of the Club's dissolution as long as a

quorum of seventy-five percent (75%) of all current Club members has voted (the vote will be by email); and (3) upon dissolution, whatever funds remain after settling liabilities and disposing of physical property will be donated to a photographyrelated organization.

The latest version of the draft amendment is published in this issue of *Photo Notes*, [see page 23] along with the procedure for its passage and adoption. It was noted that this issue was reviewed by member Jill Griess, an attorney, as well as her law firm colleagues.

A discussion was had about section two of the proposed amendment regarding the different composition of voting members (members present vs. full membership) for the two separate actions needing approval before dissolution. It was suggested that this issue be submitted to the lawyers for review.

B. *Image Sizing*: Helen noted that image size requirements for competition and theme night submissions has been updated to 2000 px on the

longest side of the image, 72 ppi resolution, and a 2 MB maximum file size.

C. Competition Manual: The revised Competition Manual has been emailed to members and posted on the Club website (you must be logged in to access it). It has instructions on how to resize images in both Photoshop and Lightroom. Hedy suggested a few additional revisions, including adding page numbers, specific language to use the original submitted image for the yearend competition; and a reference to sRBG color space.

D. Print Salon Presentation: Jeff Langford reported that members of the Print Salon had decided not to proceed with a presentation of their prints, citing the difficulties in finding an appropriate location and determining the best way to display the images for a group of people. Instead, Print Salon members are looking into the possibility of a gallery show for all Club members, perhaps in conjunction with Professional Women Photographers (PWP). Betsy Currier is looking into this.

E. *Meeting Start Time*: At previous meetings, a majority

of the members present had indicated a desire to return to a start time of 6:30 p.m. for all meetings (presently the Club competitions start at 6:30 p.m. but all other meetings start at 7 p.m.). This has been approved by the Executive Committee and will become effective in September, 2025.

F. Competition Limits: Chuck reported that the Executive Committee had considered various options to shorten the length of monthly competitions, which typically last for about 2 hours. Limiting the number of entries from 2 to 1 image per member is not favored by the membership, as doing so would limit feedback from judges. A proposal to limit submissions to 12 per year, as opposed to 16, was reviewed, but coordinating and tracking such a system was thought to be too complex to implement. Chuck noted that, should the Club membership grow to a point where the current 2 images per member per month is unworkable, the policy will be revisited. It was also noted that, because the competitions are recorded and the recordings posted on the website, members can leave early if need be and catch up on the evening at a later time.

Marlene Schonbrun relayed a message from Ann Broder,

who was unable to attend. Ann asked whether it was possible to have a few themed competitions. A discussion ensued. While there is general member interest in doing so, there remain issues to be resolved, including whether or how to count points toward the year end total; whether the Club could hire a judge for a member theme night; and how hiring additional judges would factor into the budget. No decision was reached.



VI. New Business

A. From the Chair:

1. Nominating Committee: A Nominating Committee needs to be created for the purpose of identifying a slate of candidates for election to the Executive Committee for the 2025-2026 Club year. The slate will be presented at the last Club meeting in April, and the floor will be open for additional nominations until the slate is voted on at the May 19th business meeting. Elayne Dix, who has served on the Nominating Committee for the past three years, volunteered

to do so again this year; Helen Pine and Richard Gold also volunteered to assist Elayne.

2. Year-End Competition: This year's Year-End Competition will use the same format as in previous years since the Club switched to Zoom meetings: the judges' scoring of members' images will be recorded, and then shown to the membership on June 2nd. Members can submit up to four of the images they submitted to competition since October 2024, but the images must be exactly the same ones --there can have been no changes. Three judges will rate the images on a score of 1-9, without comment. The deadlines for submission will be announced in *Photo Notes*. Those images that were submitted using the old (smaller) size requirements will need to be resized so that the images presented will all be the same size. Hedy said she would take care of this.

3. Otto Litzel Memorial Dinner: Planning for the Otto Litzel Memorial Dinner in June needs to begin. Members were asked for suggested locations, which would need to accommodate 30-40 members, preferably

have a private room or space, and a reasonable price point. Chuck suggested John's Pizzeria or Carmine's in the Times Square area and Dallas BBQ (several locations). Marlene Schonbrun will look into Serafina's at 105th Street and Broadway; Michael Schleiff will look into Arté Cafe B. From the Floor on West 73rd Street: Bonnie Dubin will look into Gazella's on Amsterdam Avenue at 81st/82nd Street; and Raylie Dunkel will look into Pier 57 near Little Island.

- 4. Zoom Recordings: See discussion, above, under Website Committee report page 19.
- 5. Expanding Visions 31: This year's Expanding Visions workshop will start on May 22nd and run weekly on Thursdays through June 26th. There is no cost to members; non-members may participate at a cost of \$60, which can be applied to membership. There will be no meet-ups this year, owing to low participation in years past. Instead, members will be given a theme to focus on each week, which will then be shared by Zoom. The themes are Earth, Water, Air, and Fire; the term project theme is Bugs. The full schedule and syllabus will be published in Photo Notes.

6. Other: Chuck noted a change in meeting dates. The PDI Workshop scheduled for April 14th will take place on April 28th, and the Member Theme Night, "After Dark," will take place on April 14th (images due April 11th).

- 1. Natalie Manzino asked about re-scheduling certain PDI Workshops, which usually take place on the third Thursday of most months.
- 2. The Otto Litzel Memorial Dinner will take place on either June 16th or 23rd, owing to Chuck and Helen Pine's travel plans.
- VII. Good and Welfare
- A. From the Chair: None.
- B. From the Floor: Marilyn Fish-Glynn reported that the images from her solo show at Soho Photo Gallery in December will be on display at her residence (The Watermark Building) on Clark Street in Downtown Brooklyn. She will send the exact dates to Chuck. Marilyn also asked that any members who visit call her first, so she can give them a tour of her images.

In addition, Marilyn noted

that Soho Photo Gallery has moved to 539 West 23rd Street, in Chelsea.

VIII. Adjournment: There being no further business, the Zoom meeting was adjourned at approximately 8:45 p.m.

Camera point of view A headshot should be shot looking directly into the face.



A camera POV that looks down on a person (even if only slightly) makes them appear more approachable and submissive.



A camera POV that is looking up at a subject tends to make the subject look in control and more commanding.

PWCC Constitution Amendment—Dissolution

After much discussion, the Club's Executive Committee has come up with a proposed amendment to the nearly ninety-year old *Park West Camera Club Constitution*. The subject of this amendment is the dissolution of the Club.

Don't worry! The Club is not considering dissolution. We are still a vital, exciting, and strong organization. We are, however, aware of what has happened to many other camera clubs since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic—they have failed and gone out of existence.

According to our current Constitution, a proposed amendment must first be presented to the membership at a business meeting (it was, on March 31st), published in *Photo Notes* (it is, you are reading it now), and then discussed and voted upon at the next business meeting (it will be, on May 19th).

Here is the wording of the proposed amendment...

Article XII Club Dissolution

Sec. 1 Should at any time a majority of the Executive Committee believe that the Park West Camera Club can no longer continue as a viable organization, they may approach the Club membership to discuss the dissolution of the Club.

Sec. 2 The motion to dissolve the Club shall be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the membership at a meeting called for the sole purpose of the Club's dissolution as long as a quorum of seventy five percent (75%) of all current Club members has voted. This vote will be conducted via email.

Sec. 3 Upon dissolution, the Executive Committee shall be responsible for the paying of all outstanding liabilities of the Club. Any and all physical property of the Club must be sold, donated, or otherwise disposed. Any money remaining in the Club's treasury will then be donated to a photographyrelated organization.

Instagram

In late 2021, PWCC launched its own Instagram page. Instagram—a social media platform that focuses on pictures more than words—seemed a natural for a camera club. Our goal is to attract followers and, potentially, new members to join Park West.




PDI Workshop

The Club's PDI (Projected Digital Image) Workshop was held on Thursday night, March 20th. Eight Park West members submitted one or two images each for comments and possible alterations using Photoshop software. Over 20 PWCCers were in the gallery and took part by offering comments and suggestions for improving the photos.

Here are some of the images that we worked on...







Julie Wosk's image of a fancy mirror in a store window was somewhat confusing and had some areas that were missing pixels. We used several tools (the Magic Wand and Quick Selection) to isolate the mirror. We created a Solid Color **Adjustment Layer** and chose a light blue color. Next, we moved the layer with the mirror above the solid color layer. Finally, we used the Spot Healing Brush to fill in the areas of the missing pixels.







Betsy Currier's image was interesting street photography. She wanted to get rid of the pole going through the dog(?). We used the **Magic Wand** to select the pole (in small sections) and then used **Content Aware Fill** to replace the chosen pixels. We **Cropped** the image slightly and removed the pole's shadow using the **Clone Tool**.





Evelyne Appel's image needed a few minor improvements. First, Edit > Transform > Rotate was used to make all the horizontal lines level. We then used the Remove Tool to get rid of the ash tray; and the Spot Healing Brush to get rid of a couple of the remaining distractions.





We felt that Jeff Langford's photo could be helped by converting it to monochrome. We used a **Black & White Adjustment Layer** to make the conversion. Next, still in the same adjustment layer, we decreased the **Blue Channel** to darken the sky and increased the **Green Channel** to lighten the leaves.

For Marlene Schonbrun's street scene we started by using the **Crop Tool**. From the top we eliminated the bare sky; from the right we eliminated the thin sliver of a building; and from the left we eliminated the first store window. We then used the **Spot Healing Brush** to get rid of the fire hydrant in front of the woman and the white truck in the background.. All of this helped to focus the viewer on the woman alone on the street.





Janet Susin's image had great shadows but we felt that there was not enough detail in the shadow and highlight areas. We opened the Camera Raw Filter, went to the Light Panel and moved the Highlight Slider to -100 and the Shadows Slider to +100. As the last step we used the Crop Tool to cut out the blank wall on the left. This moved the man's face to one of the Power Points (intersection of two Rule of Thirds lines).



The woman was holding a cigarette with billowing smoke in Charles Levin's photo. We thought the smoke should stand out more. We used the Magic Wand Tool to select the smoke. Next, we increased the brightness with Edit > Adjustments > Brightness/
Contrast. Then used Select > Inverse and lowered the brightness of the rest of the image slightly to make the smoke stand out even more.







Carlton Johnson's cat photo was a little too contrasty and was too tightly cropped for our taste. Using the **Crop Tool**, set to **Content Aware Fill**, we extended the canvas by about ¼" on the top and on the right, thus giving more space for the ear and the whiskers. Then we opened the **Camera Raw Filter**, went to the **Light Panel**, and moved the **Contrast Slider** slightly to the left. [Although not visible here, because the black background of the image was shown against a black screen, we suggested adding a thin, 1 or 2 pixel white **Stroke** around the entire image.]


Tulips of all colors are emerging. Walking around a pond, enjoying its reflections, is my favorite pastime. So many pictures to take.

Food

The 10th iteration of our Club's You Be the Judge competition was all about food. Nineteen Park West members submitted one image each on this subject. The only official rules—and there were two of them—are: the image had to be related, in some way, to edibles; and it may not have been previously shared with the Club in any way, shape, or form.

After all the images were submitted they were made into a slide show and distributed to the entire Club membership in the form of a ballot. All of us were able to rate the images from one (the lowest score) to five (the highest) and add a comment or two. Twenty-five PWCCers responded.

The highest possible score (receiving a five from every voting member) would be 125 points. The lowest, 25 points. The actual range for this evening was from 65 to 104.

To make the scores more understandable, we converted them to Cs, Bs, As, Honors, and one winner. The Honor images all received scores in the 90s; the A images in the 80s; and the B images in the 70s to 60s. (There were not any C images.)






Interpretations



In last month's President's Message I indicated that the Flushing Camera Club was no longer in existence. This was in error—although not really my fault. Let me explain.

I received an email from Joe Crupi, a member of the that club. Joe took the PWCC Expanding Visions class a few years back and was, therefore, on our mailing list for *Photo Notes*. He read the March issue, saw that I wrote that the FCC was defunct, and wrote to me to correct my mistake. This is Joe's email...

Hello Chuck,

I am so glad I read your latest newsletter.

I learned you found Flushing Camera Club no longer exists.

Well, we are still here and have been for 54 years.

Unfortunately, a few years ago we changed our web site to be hosted by a company called Wild Apricot.

Headshot Tip

Background choice

The choice of background has a big impact on a headshot. Black or white are the most common background colors. Choose which works best with the model depending on the subject's hair color, skin tone, clothing, etc.



Other colors can be used for special effects.

If shooting group portraits use a light to medium grey backdrop. The light grey tone will work best with a variety of colors and contrasts.



Sky Replacement

With the Sky Replacement feature in Photoshop you now have control over one of the elements that can make or break an image.

The skies that come with Photoshop are great, but it's easy to spot them. In addition, we don't allow them in our competitions. But all is not lost! You can add your own skies into the mix. Here's how...

1 Open the Sky Replacement dialog box (click on Edit >

dialog box (click on **Edit** > **Sky Replacement**).

2 Click on the Preview of the currently selected sky.

3. In the window that opens click the settings gear wheel at the top right.

4 Select **Get More Skies** > **Import Images** to add your own skies to the list.



This gives you the ability to add your own skies to improve your images.

Patterns





New From Apple

Apple announced new updates of several of their products in early March. This includes the Mac Studio, MacBook Air, and the iPad.

There are two versions of the Mac Studio. The base model has an M4 Max chip, both Thunderbolt 4 (four of them) and USB-A ports, as well as a slot for your SD memory cards. It's going for \$1,999. The higher-end model features an M3 Ultra chip and, according to Apple, is the most powerful Mac to date. The M3 Ultra has more ports, more memory, and actually more of just about everything, including the starting price of \$3,999.

Apple's entry-level laptop, the MacBook Air, comes in two sizes, 13-inch and 15-inch. They each have an M4 processor and come in four colors. Even more interesting, though, Apple has cut the prices. The 13- and 15-inch models now start at \$999 and \$1,199.

There are two new models of the iPad tablet. The new 11" Apple iPad Air is now equipped with the M3 chip and starts at \$599. The new 11" iPad has an A16 chip and starts at \$349. Both have a 2360 x 1640 pixel Retina Touchscreen, built in Wi-Fi, come in a choice of colors, can be upgraded with more RAM, storage, and a 5G phone connection.









Portable Printing



Print high-quality documents, including borderless photos, with the Canon Pixma TR160 Portable Wireless Printer. It's compact and lightweight and designed for portability. It features an optional battery for printing from anywhere. Also, easily print wirelessly directly from a compatible computer, phone, or tablet. All this for only \$249.99.

DxO PureRAW 5

The DxO PureRAW upgrade to Version 5 is almost here. It will be released on April 15th. It is more powerful than ever.

The new program has a wide range of new features. Local adjustments let you make targeted changes to the most demanding RAW files. Intuitive tools allow users to create a series of masks to fine-tune denoising and target sharpness, all with a refined level of precision.

Aperture Moving



Aperture is a not-for-profit publisher of photography. From their base in New York City, Aperture connects global audiences and supports artists through their quarterly magazine, books, exhibitions, digital platforms, public programs, limited-edition prints, and awards. It was established in 1952 to advance "creative thinking, significantly expressed in words and photographs..."

Aperture will soon have a new permanent home, in two floors of a historic building in the heart of New York's Upper West Side. Located at 380 Columbus Avenue at 78th Street. The new space is across from the American Museum of Natural History and blocks from the New York Historical Society and Central Park.

The new home will have more space for public events, small-scale exhibitions, photo installations, plus the Aperture bookstore. The new space is set to open in mid-April, 2025.





Galari: E-Paper

Galari's E-paper display is so paper-like, smooth, subtle, and natural, that it feels more like art than tech. In fact, it is so realistic that people often mistake it for a traditional paper print.

Measuring 14.5" wide by 11.8" high, the Galari shows images up to 10.5" by 8" on any wall or flat surface. It uses a rechargeable battery that runs for up to six months before needing a recharge, or it can plug in to any outlet.

You can download images from any website or load your own on an SD card.


The Galari comes in three different wooden frames—beech, mahogany, walnut—and with interchangeable white or black mats

The Galari E-paper is now in the Kickstarter phase of being developed. The date it is expected to ship is late summer 2025 at a price of \$699 (early bird discounts are/will be available).

Did You Know?

The sensor is where light is captured and converted into an image. Generally, larger sensors can gather more light, leading to better image quality and reduced noise.

Although smartphone sensors are smaller compared to those in mirrorless or DSLRs or cameras, advances



in sensor technology have optimized them for better performance in limited light.



Compact Medium Format



The FujiFilm GFX100RF is a compact medium format camera that is rangefinderinspired. Its 102MP sensor packs performance into a sleek, lightweight, all-metal housing. Coming in silver or black, the camera features a built-in fixed focal length 35mm f-4 lens and offers an array of options such as film simulations, digital teleconverters, and more. The cost is a low (for medium format digital) at \$4,899.

Compact Canon



The Canon EOS R50 V Mirror-less Camera is a hybrid, inter-changeable lens body designed for both stills and video. The 24.2MP APS-c camera has all the usual stuff you'd expect, plus a vertical tripod mount, in a sleek, brick-like shape. It weighs in at a mere 13.1 ounces and has a similarly light price tag of \$649 (lens not included).

Canon for Vlogging



Canon has pushed compact camera even further with the newly designed 22.3MP 1.4" CMOS sensor in their Power-Shot V1. This sensor is approximately twice as large as at 1" sensors found in comparable models (such as the Sony ZV series). It comes with a 16-50mm equivalent zoom range (maximum aperture of *f*-2.8-4.5) lens, Optical IS and a built-in 3-stop ND filter—all for \$899.

Framing
Unless there is a creative reason that requires a horizontal (also called the landscape) format, you are better off shooting headshots in a vertical (aka the portrait) format.



PropsProps with headshots should be eliminated or used minimally.

Hair

Your subject will be more critical about their hair than just about any other aspect of the headshot. Always check the hair before taking the shot.

- **3.** Guard your Medicare card like it's a credit card.




Going Retro

Using Your Camera

Tulip Tips

Tulips traditionally bloom in the spring, usually from mid-March through May. The Netherlands is well-regarded as the best place in the world to see and shoot them. There are also several spots in the US noted for tulips—Holland, Michigan and Skagit County, Washington. But we've also got tulip fields much closer to home—Kelder's Farm Tulip Festival in Kerhonkson, New York and Holland Ridge Farms in Cream Ridge, New Jersey. Both of these should be in full bloom from mid-April through mid-May.

If you're planning a trip to see tulips anywhere, here are a few tips that should come in handy...



Beware of Backgrounds
Sometimes backgrounds can
add to an image. Eliminating
distracting backgrounds,
however, is paramount in
photographing any flowers.
The best way to accomplish
this is by simply walking
around the scene and finding
a vantage point from which
the undesirable background
elements are not visible.





Get Close
Sure, wide fields of of
flowers can make great
images, but so can
focusing in on the small
details, or just a part, of
a single bloom. Think
about using special
close-up or macro
equipment.



Point of View

Try to present tulips in a way they are not usually seen—like from a low angle. And with today's articulating LCD screens, you don't have to get down and dirty to accomplish this.



Controlling DoF will result in a strong and dynamic image. For example, with an out of focus foreground and/or background, you can keep the attention on a single tulip just by keeping it sharply focused.



Headshot Tip

Expose Correctly

Take the exposure reading directly from the subject's skin. Use the spot metering function on the camera to avoid metering the background. Better yet, use a handheld incident meter.

Leading Lines: Real and Implied

Leading lines are a powerful tool in photography. When they are actually present they guide the viewer's eye towards a specific subject or point of interest. Leading lines can be straight, curved, diagonal, converging, or even parallel. They create a sense of depth, perspective, and movement in the photograph.

On the other hand, implied leading lines are elements in a composition that suggest the presence of lines, even if they are not actually visible. Implied leading lines can be created by shapes, patterns, objects, or the direction of a subject's gaze. They imply a sense of direction or movement, guiding the viewer's eye through the frame without the need for explicit lines.





The solution to this huge problem is the memory card holder. These accessories come in several designs and types including hard cases, wallets, pouches, and more. Headshot Tips

Use a medium telephoto lens like 85mm, 105mm, or 135mm.

Use an aperture of *f*-5.6 to *f*-9. You want enough depth-of-field to keep the face sharp, but let the background go soft.



Focus on the eyes. A headshot with soft focus on the eyes never looks good.

Use a tripod to compose your headshots better and to not have the framing and focusing thrown out of balance.

Fundamental Photoshop Skills

Whether you're shooting with a DSLR, mirrorless, or even a smartphone, post-processing/editing is a key part of creating a winning image. Good editing can turn a decent photo into a stunning one—and the best part is, you don't need to master every tool at once. By focusing on a few fundamental skills, you can take your photography to the next level.



Cropping & Straightening
Sometimes a photo just needs a tiny compositional adjustment.
Learn to crop to remove distractions and guide the viewer's eye to the subject.
Similarly, straight horizons or vertical lines can make an image feel much more balanced and professional.

Exposure/Contrast Adjustment
Exposure correction helps fix
images that are too dark or
overly bright. Tweaking
contrast brings depth and
definition, especially in flat or
hazy photos. These basic
adjustments can immediately
make your photos more
dynamic and true to life.



White Balance & Color Correction
Learn to adjust white balance
to ensure that whites look
neutral and skin tones appear
natural. Mastering this gives
your photos a clean, polished
look—free from color casts.

Sharpening & Noise Reduction A little sharpening can help details pop, especially when resizing an image. On the flip side, reducing noise (especially in low-light shots) helps smooth out grainy or pixelated areas while keeping texture.



Cloning and Spot Removal
Dust spots, blemishes, and
small distractions can sneak
into even the best shots. Learn
how to use the clone tool or
healing brush to clean up these
imperfections without altering
the overall look of the image.

Dodging and Burning
Use dodge and burn tools to
subtly brighten or darken
specific areas of your photo to
enhance mood, draw focus, or
add dimension. It's a powerful
way to guide the viewer's eye.

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





When you retouch skin, you should not remove all skin texture. We are all used to looking at people up-close. Skin texture looks normal.

Wrinkles look normal. Yes, it's important to make your subject look their best. But if you remove all skin texture and wrinkles, your subject will begin to take on the look of a plastic doll.





SD Card Care

Beware Water, Heat, And Dirt

Similar to any electronic gear, SD cards don't respond well to being wet, to temperature changes or dirt.

Keep them away from spilled coffee or tea. Don't store your DSLR (or memory cards) in the trunk of your hot car and then bring it into an air-conditioned room.



The contact points of the memory card are especially sensitive. You can clean them with isopropyl alcohol, but make sure you don't scratch the contacts or give them a static electricity shock.

Use a plastic case to protect the cards.
