They completely altered the way that we created and shared our photos/images.

Now, after almost a quarter of a century later, AI (Artificial Intelligence), all by itself, is changing everything,... again!

On one hand, AI is helping us make better photos. It is already being used to improve blemishes, sharpen photos, remove digital noise, add skies —and the list goes on and on. I think we'd all agree that this use of AI is quite beneficial. These tools can make your post-processing faster, easier, and more fun.

On the other hand, AI has given us computer-generated images that are being passed off as real photographs. All you need to do is type in a few words (prompts) and the software searches millions of stock images and provide you with results that match your verbal or written input.

The question is not whether artificial intelligence should be permitted in photography, in general, and at Park West, in



specific—but how far should we let it go?

Should we respond with "anything goes"? Should we say no AI at all? Or should we limit AI to certain uses only? If so, which ones?

I think we should have a discussion about this. I think all Club members should be in attendance and participate. I believe that this subject is

very complex and will need more than a few minutes, or even a half an hour at one of our business meetings.

Therefore, I am suggesting that we take one of the Club's summer meetings and dedicate it to this topic.

Other images should be titled as follows:


Name_Number_Title

Expanding Visions 30



"Reflections"

Expanding Visions is a photography class being offered this spring into summer. It is open to all interested photographers.

Expanding Visions is a marriage of a field trip class with a class in photographic seeing. This eightweek class (Thursday evenings, May 9th thru June 27th) will open your mind to new ways of seeing photographs, subject matter, equipment, and techniques. It will also allow you to explore parts of the City that you may not have experienced before.

The format of the class is simple: We start with an introductory Zoom session. We will discuss equipment, techniques, and the specifics of the course; a term project will be assigned. For the next two weeks we'll go on field trips to work on the assignments. The following session will bring us back to a Zoom review where we'll share our photographs, talk about our experiences, and evaluate what, and how well, we learned. Two more weeks of trips and assignments will be followed by a second Zoom review session. Week eight brings us to the final Zoom meeting where we will review the term project and any make-up assignments.

The basic thread running through the assignments in Expanding Visions 30 is reflections in an assortment of surfaces.

Not too complicated, is it? Lots of fun and educational; but most of all, it will expand your vision in the photographs you take, and allow you to grow as a photographer.

Year-End Competition

The Year-End Competition will be held on Monday, June 3rd. It's different from our monthly competitions: both the rules of entry and the judging are different.

Each Club member may submit up to four PDIs. But, and this is a big BUT—all the submissions must have been entered into one of the monthly competitions held earlier this year (October through May). It doesn't matter if the images were awarded honors or got a 'C'— they are eligible for this competition. Another

big BUT—images may not be altered from the way they were first entered even if the judge said "that would improve the photo" —it must be the original, unaltered image with the same title (including the original month of entry). Absolutely no changes!!!

The image submission deadline is 11:59 p.m. on Monday, May 20th.

There will be three judges. Each of the judges will score from one to five points for each image. The scores will be added and the total will be announced. An

image can accumulate from 3 to 15 points. The judges make no comments during the scoring.

There will be one winner (the PDI-of-the-Year) plus four runners-up. If there are tie scores for the PDI-of-the-Year there will be additional votes cast by the judges to determine the winner. If more than four images are tied for runner-up, they will all be declared runners-up.

Due to the uncertainties of Zooming, the judging will be done prior to the date stated above. This way we can edit the recording for time.

Nomination and Election Procedures

We began the Club's yearly election procedures at the March business meeting with the naming of the Nominating Committee: Elayne Dix and Bruce Byers.

The Nominating
Committee will present
their slate of (at least) one
nominee for each position
on the Executive Committee
(president, vice president,
treasurer, corresponding/
membership secretary, and
recording secretary) to the
membership at the last
meeting in April. This year
they will also be seeking to



name two at-large members for the first time in Club history. Any Club member interested in running for an office you should contact the Nominating Committee.

After the Nominating Committee's slate has been announced, the floor will be opened to nominations. Any Park West member may nominate any other Club member. Nominations will be accepted from the floor at each Club meeting leading up to, but not including, the May business meeting.

The next phase of the PWCC election process is the election itself. This takes place at the May business meeting. If there is only one nominee for each position, then a motion may be made asking the Club's recording secretary to cast a unanimous vote for the slate. Should there be more than one nominee for any of the seven positions, then a vote must be taken for that position (those positions). (The secretary can still cast the unanimous vote for the unopposed candidates.)

Members must be present to cast a vote.



ExCom Minutes

March 21, 2024 (Via Zoom)

The meeting called to order at 4 p.m.

The meeting was called to discuss current issues and possible agenda items for the upcoming business meeting on March 25th.

- 1. NYMACC (New York Metro Area Camera Council): Former Club President Ed Lee has been serving as the Club liaison to NYMACC. It was learned that Ed had paid the annual dues for PWCC. Treasurer Joe Nawy will reach out to Ed about reimbursing him for the payment.
- 2. Revisiting Meeting Times:
 Following a discussion at
 the November 2023 Business
 Meeting about changing the
 starting time for weekly
 meetings, the Executive
 Committee decided to
 keep the starting time for

competitions at 6:30 p.m., but change the starting time of all other meetings to 7 p.m. (This was to accommodate members who are working and may not be able to make the 6:30 p.m. start time.) At the time it was also agreed to revisit the change in starting time. Following further discussion on changing the starting times back to 6:30 p.m., it was decided to add this topic to the March 25th Business Meeting for further consideration.

- 3. New Club Business Card: All suggested changes to the new Club business card have been input, and the Executive Committee has signed off on it. The issue will be put to members at the March 25th Business Meeting for approval by members.
- 4. Dissolution Clause for Club Constitution: Helen noted that other camera clubs that she and Chuck belong to have written provisions in their governing documents that detail a procedure for dissolving themselves. They include conditions that may trigger dissolution (e.g., drop in membership to certain levels, lack of officers), as well as how to dispose of any club assets or equipment. While PWCC does not have any such language in its Club constitution, it was

- agreed that such language would be added. PWCC is incorporated as a non-profit in Delaware; as such, it cannot share the proceeds of any asset sales with members and must donate the equipment or assets to a not-for-profit. Helen will share the research she has done on the subject, and the issue will be raised at the March 25th Business Meeting.
- 5. Nominating Committee and Election of Executive Committee Members: Procedures for the Nominating Committee to follow for the upcoming election of the Executive Committee will be drafted. It was agreed that the Executive Committee will assist the Nominating Committee to set up Zooms on the Club's account and with sending emails to the full membership using the Club's email listsery.
- 6. April Workshop: For the workshop scheduled for the end of April, it was agreed to ask members who presented composited images at the recent 'Interpretations' theme night if they would be interested in presenting details on how they prepared their images. Chuck will make the inquiries.



- 7. Expanding Visions 30: This year's Expanding Visions 30 ('Reflections') will start on Thursday, May 9th, with an introductory Zoom session. That will be followed, on successive Thursdays, by two field trip/shooting sessions, a Zoom review session, two more field trip/shooting sessions and a Zoom review session, and a Zoom final review session. Chuck and Helen expect to be in New York to attend the shooting sessions.
- 8. Year-End Competition:
 The three judges for the year-end competition on June 3rd are still being selected. It was agreed to follow the same procedure as in the past few years: images will be submitted two weeks in advance; a Zoom session with the judges will be recorded a week before; and then the recording will be shown to members at the June 3rd meeting.




The meeting was adjourned at 5:30 p.m.

Artificial Women

Julie Wosk announces the publication of her new book Artificial Women: Sex Dolls, Robot Caregivers, and More Facsimile Females (Indiana University Press). It highlights how artificial women are depicted in films, television, photography, art, literature, and robotics.

With advances in AI, these facsimile females seem more lifelike, and they are having an impact on our social relationships, our views of women, and how we think about what makes us human.

Julie's previous books include My Fair Ladies: Female Robots, Androids, and Other Artificial Eves; Women and the Machine: Representations From the Spinning Wheel to the Electronic Age; and Breaking Frame; Technology and the Visual Arts in the Nineteenth Century.



Business Meeting Minutes

March 25, 2024 (Via Zoom)

Presiding: Executive Committee members President Chuck Pine, Vice President Michael Schleiff, Corresponding Secretary Helen Pine, Recording Secretary Christine Doyle, and Treasurer Joe Nawy.

I. Call To Order: Chuck Pine called the meeting to order at approximately 7 p.m. There being 29 members present, a quorum was met. Chuck introduced the members of the current Executive Committee: himself, President; Michael Schleiff, Vice President; Helen Pine, Corresponding Secretary; Christine Doyle, Recording Secretary; and Joe Nawy, Treasurer.

II. Minutes of Previous Business Meeting: By motion, members present agreed to waive the reading of the minutes of the November 27, 2023 Business Meeting. (They were published in the December 2023 issue of the *Photo Notes* newsletter, which is available on the PWCC website.)

III. Treasurer's Report: Joe Nawy presented his Treasurer's Report for the time period June 30, 2023 through March 25,



2024: [The full Treasurer's Report is not for the general public. A version of the minutes with the full Treasurer's Report was emailed to all members of the Club.]

A question was asked about whether the Club should increase the fees it pays to judges (\$125) and speakers (\$100) should be increased since they haven't changed in many years. Chuck noted that these amounts are higher than those paid by other camera clubs that he is familiar with. Christine will reach out to the Program Committee chairs to see whether any judges or speakers have declined invitations because the fees were too low.

IV. Committee Reports (these reports are from our active committees; the Archive, Field Trip, Gallery and House Committees are currently inactive):

Competition: Chair Hedy Klein noted that images for the April competition are due tonight, and members should send her a separate email if they want to receive confirmation of receipt.. Membership: Co-chair Marlene Schonbrun reported that the Club has 88 paid members as of this date, 19 of which are new members. [Note: It was subsequently learned that the number of new members is 10, not 19.] The Club website seems to be drawing in the most new members. In addition, Marlene has been in touch personally with some individuals who have expressed interest in joining the Club.



Photo Notes: Chair Chuck Pine asked that any content for the next issue of the newsletter be submitted by Monday, April 1st. Members are invited to submit articles, portfolios, and other images of interest at any time prior to that.

Program: Co-chair Marilyn Fish-Glynn reported that the following judges and speakers have been booked through the end of May. She is working on lining up judges for the yearend competition.

Social/Sunshine: A chair is needed for the Social Committee, to help organize Club events (including the upcoming Otto Litzel Memorial Dinner). Natalie Manzino has stepped down as chair, but she will continue to send out Sunshine Committee cards.

Website: Co-chair Michael Schleiff reported that the Club website is getting good traffic and invited members to submit any new ideas or suggestions. Recordings of recent monthly competitions and guest speaker presentations (where their permission is given) are posted on the website.

Workshop: No chair/no report. A workshop is scheduled for the end of April.

Print Salon: No report.

V. Old Business

A. New Club Business Card: Changes to the new Club business card have been input. Christine will work with Will Aimesbury to get the final version to members, so that a vote on allocating funds for the cards can be taken at the May Business Meeting.

B. Revisiting Monday Night Meeting Times: Following a discussion at the November 2023 Business Meeting about changing the starting time for weekly meetings, the Executive Committee decided to keep the starting time for competitions at 6:30 p.m., but change the starting time of all our other meetings to 7 p.m. (This was to accommodate members who are working and may not be able to make the 6:30 p.m start time.) At the time it was also agreed to re-visit the change in starting time at a subsequent time. Following further discussion on changing the starting times back to 6:30 p.m, it was decided that the Executive Committee will email members to get a consensus. Any change in meeting time will take effect in September 2024.

C. Other: The Club's Gallery Committee has been inoperative since the beginning of the Covid pandemic.

VI. New Business


A. Nominating Committee -Elections for Executive Committee in May: Volunteers for the Nominating Committee are needed. Chuck gave details of what the volunteers will be doing. The Nominating Committee is tasked with identifying nominees for the Executive Committee's officers and atlarge members. Interested members can submit their names to the Nominating Committee over the next several weeks. The Nominating Committee will report the results on April 29th. Nominations then continue through the week before the May 29th Business Meeting, when the elections will take place. Elayne Dix and Bruce Byers have volunteered to serve on the Nominating Committee. Chuck will make an announcement about the Nominating Committee at next week's competition.

Elayne Dix suggested that the current members of the Executive Committee affirmatively announce their intention and nominate themselves if they intend to run again for their current positions. She also suggested that nominees draft a statement about themselves and their ideas for future club activities. Chuck noted that the Executive Committee hold a planning meeting in the month after the elections.

Bill Apple, citing the Club's constitution, reminded the Nominating Committee that it may present two candidates for each Club office; it's not limited to one per office. Bill also requested that Club president Chuck Pine prepare a brief, two-paragraph statement about where he thought the Club would be five years from now and how to get there. Chuck said he would consult with the rest of the Executive Committee on this matter.

B. April 29th Workshop:
Following up on the recent
Club member theme night
"Interpretations," Chuck is
putting together a workshop
whereby members will
describe how they prepared
the images that they presented
at the theme night, or any other
composited image that they
worked on in the past.

C. Expanding Visions 30: This year's Expanding Visions 30 ('Reflections') will start on Thursday, May 9th, with an introductory Zoom session. That will be followed, on successive Thursdays, by two assignment sessions, a Zoom review session, two more assignment sessions and a Zoom review session, and a Zoom final review session. Members can either participate in the assignment sessions or complete the assignments on their own. Chuck and Helen expect to be in New York to attend the shooting sessions. Expanding Visions is free to members, and \$70 to non-members.



D. Year-End Competition: The year-end competition will take place at the June 3rd meeting. Members can submit up to 4 of the images that they submitted

during the year's monthly competitions. These images can not have been changed from the versions that were originally submitted. Three judges are employed for the year-end competition; they do not give comments, only scores from 1 to 5. It was agreed to follow the same procedure as in the past few years: images will be submitted two weeks in advance; a Zoom session with the judges will take place and be recorded a week before; and then the recording will be shown to members at the June 3rd meeting.

E. Social Committee/Otto Litzel Year-End Dinner: The Otto Litzel Year-End Dinner is scheduled for Monday, June 10th. The outgoing Social Committee chair Natalie Manzino will contact members of the Social Committee to see who is available to organize the year-end dinner.

F. New York Metro Area Camera Council (NYMACC): Chuck reported that PWCC is a founding member of NYMACC, an organization of New York metro area camera clubs that meets to discuss organizational and related issues.

G. Dissolution Clause for Club Constitution: Chuck reported that the Executive Committee has begun the process of crafting language for the Club constitution that will detail a procedure for dissolving the Club should the need ever arise. It's anticipated that this will include conditions that trigger dissolution (e.g., drop in membership to certain levels, lack of officers), as well as how to dispose of any club assets or equipment. Park West is incorporated in Delaware as a nonprofit; as such, it cannot share the proceeds of any asset sales with members and must donate the equipment or assets to a nonprofit. It was stressed that there are no current plans to dissolve the Club; this action is being taken to ensure that there is a set procedure should the Club be dissolved. Christine will contact a friend who handles pro bono cases for information on legal referrals.

Member Bruce Byers noted that members should think about what they want for the Club and come up with ideas on how to get there.

Member Raylie Dunkel added that she enjoys the camaraderie of photo walks and meet-ups with fellow members, and offered to help organize future gatherings. There is a list of members who are interested in 'pop-up' field trips that will be updated. Helen will

send an email to all members to see who would be interested in participating in these outings and will circulate a list of members names and emails.

H. Other: There was no other new business.

I. From the Floor:
Bruce Byers noted that he will be visiting galleries in New York, in connection with the opening of his own gallery in Catskill, NY, and offered to include Club members when he does so. The updated list of members interested in popup field trips will be useful

Hummers

100s of kinds of hummingbirds nest in the American tropics, and more than a dozen in the western U.S., but east of the Great Plains there is only the Ruby-throated hummingbird. It is fairly common in summer in open woods and gardens. Hovering in front of a flower to sip nectar, it beats its wings more than 50 times per second.



Most of the Ruby-throats will arrive in the New York area in late April or early May. Migrating males usually arrive a week or so before the females at any given location.

The adult male has an iridescent ruby throat (hence the name), if you catch the light at a good angle, otherwise it looks black in most light.

From the NYMACC website: NYMACC provides a forum for the sharing of photography group leadership, expertise and challenges.

NYMACC meets on the second Tuesday of each month. PDI Workshop

The March PDI Workshop (projected digital image) had 10 images from five Club members. We looked at and commented on all of them. Some of the images were opened in Photoshop and adjustments made based on the comments by all the Club members in attendance.

Here are some of the results from the workshop...







We all thought Michael Schleiff's subway shot was a funny and well done image but that it could use a couple of minor corrections. First, we used **Edit > Transform > Distort** to straighten the lines in the tiles on the back wall. Next, we removed the striped sign on the right edge of the image by selecting it with the **Rectangular Marquee Tool** and then used **Edit > Content-Aware Fill...** to replace the sign with tiles. Finally, we used the **Spot Healing Brush** to fill in that white spot on the left side of the image.










Paul Grebanier's street shot was busy, "too busy" many of us thought. Paul disagreed! We used the **Crop** tool to eliminate areas on the left side and bottom of the image to concentrate the viewers eye on the bike rider and steam. We also removed the trash can by selecting it with the **Lasso** tool and then using **Edit > Content-Aware Fill...** to fill in the area.



Charles Levin's shot in the park was a nice capture of the two kids but the background was too busy. We used the **Crop** tool to get rid of most of the distractions but were left with the gate in the hedges. We selected that area with the Lasso tool and used both **Edit > Content-Aware Fill...** (top right) and then Generative Fill (bottom right) to fill in the selected area. Which do you prefer?

This panned image of a wood stork in flight by Chuck Pine had only one flaw—it was too centered. We suggested adding more space on the bottom of the image to put the bird on the upper "Rule of Thirds" line. This was done using the **Crop** tool set to **Content-Aware Fill**. We pulled down from the bottom of the image and hit "enter"—and voilá!









We liked Evelyne Appel's image of the French flag flying in the breeze. The sky, however, was quite noisy. We went to Filter > Camera Raw Filter... and opened the **Detail** Panel. We moved both the **Noise Reduction** and **Color Noise Reduction** sliders all the way to the right (+100) to remove the noise. We then used the Spot Healing Brush to remove the flagpole on the right and a small tree branch on the left.





Jay Bitkower's night shot needed a little work. We used **Select Subject** to isolate the two guys. A **Brightness/Contrast Adjustment Layer** was used to lighten them up slightly. The selection was then **Inverted** and the background was given a slight **Gaussian Blur**. Next, the bright sign in the background was selected with the **Lasso Tool** and then painted with a pink color and the **Brush Tool** set at a 10% **Opacity**. Finally, we used the **Crop Tool**, set to **Content Aware Fill**, to extend the bottom of the frame and add the cut-off part of the shoe.





Paul Grebanier showed us two versions of the same image and asked us which we liked the best. Most of us agreed that the image on the left had too much going on in it. The almost-monochrome shot was our choice.




Scavenger Hunt

It's called "Waterproof Ear Covers." They come in a pack of 200 pieces. And best of all, they cost under \$8.—that's less than 4¢ apiece.

They make perfect lens covers! They will protect the front of your lens from rain, from splashes, from blowing dust or sand. They are easy to put on the front of your lens; and easy off. They take up no room in your camera bag or pocket. And if you lose it,... who cares?

Best of all, they're clear plastic, you can shoot through them for creative effects (think *Expanding Visions*).

Monitor Calibration

Calibrating your monitor isn't something that many casual computer users think much about, but for many photographers, it is critical! A calibrated monitor will accurately show you the colors and tones in your images, so when you share or print them, you have done everything you can to ensure the final photo is seen as you intended.

The calibrating of your monitor isn't a difficult, or time-consuming process,

nor too expensive these days. It does require the purchase of a device called a colorimeter and then installing its software on your computer. Once you're set up, it'll take you less than 15 minutes to calibrate your monitor. Calibration should be done every few months to assure that you continue to get top results.

Two colorimeter/software packages are out there that top the list for offering the best quality and bang for your buck.

Repetition

Repetition means repeating the same or similar objects multiple times in a photo to create a good composition. For example, you can capture numerous tennis balls next to each other or like architectural elements that align to form an aesthetically pleasing layout.

When you consciously look for something specific, you'll be more than amazed by what you find when you're just walking around with your camera. Sometimes you'll find linear repetitions, sometimes it'll be in the form of patterns.

Filling the frame creates a unique abstract effect, but it can also give the impression of a large number of repetitive

elements in your photos. You can easily achieve this by zooming in enough to fill your frame with repetitive patterns without leaving empty space.

Some common examples of this technique are brick walls, bicycles parked in a line, faces in a crowd, etc. Any repetition of the same or similar objects can work.



Landscapes usually require a great Depth-of-Field, which means a slow shutter speed, which means camera shake.
Using a tripod will prevent camera movement.

The Ethics of PJ

Recently, I was reading an online article regarding the ethics of photojournalism (PJ for short). Basically, the realm of photojournalism is capturing moments that tell stories. And these stories are supposed to be truthful. This raises the question of how much editing is permissible for these images.

It's crucial to understand that PJ aims to give an accurate and truthful representation of events. The integrity of the photograph is fundamental! Ensuring that the narrative remains unaltered is critical! The guiding principle is clear: any modification that changes the factual story or misleads the viewer is a no-no.

Since all digital images must/should go through some post-processing, just what is permitted and not permitted? Here are the basic guidelines... Do This

- the white balance and color tones to reflect the scene more accurately is generally acceptable. These adjustments correct or camera or lighting limitations, helping the image depict what the human eye sees.
- **Cropping:** Cropping the image is often necessary to focus the viewer's attention on the main subject, remove distractions, or fit the final layout. However, it must not alter the context or meaning of the image.
- Adjusting brightness and contrast can help to recover details that are too dark or too bright, especially in challenging lighting. Like color correction, the goal is to mirror the scene's true appearance.
- **Sharpening:** Sharpening can be applied to enhance

clarity, especially if the image is slightly soft. Oversharpening, however, can introduce artifacts and is generally frowned upon.

Don't Do This

- Manipulating Content:
 Adding or removing any elements from an image
 (e.g., people, objects, backgrounds) is prohibited as it alters the reality the photo represents.
- Misrepresentative Filters:
 Applying filters or effects
 that dramatically change the
 image's mood or perception
 is not allowed. This kind of
 alterations can mislead
 viewers, affecting their
 understanding of the event.
- Selective Editing: Altering specific areas of an image to highlight or downplay certain elements can bias the viewer's perception and is therefore unacceptable.





Using Your Camera

Burning Brillo


To shoot spectacular steel wool images, you need to use a long exposure—long enough to get both still elements and those elements in motion.

Here's what you'll need:

- Camera and lens (a windangle-to-short-telephoto zoom lens would be your best choice)
- A tripod and remote shutter release (or the camera's selftimer function)
- Steel wool (despite the subtitle of this article, don't use Brillo, or SOS, or other steel wool that's infused with any soap or other substances)
- String
- A lighter or matches
- Low light
- Protective equipment (glasses or goggles, gloves, a fire extinguisher, etc.)

Here's what to do:

- Make sure you choose an open space that is free from materials that can catch on fire.
- 2. Set up your camera and tripod. Be sure to attach the remote shutter release.
- 3. Set the camera to Manual exposure mode and also to manual focus. Set the ISO to automatic. Set aperture



of *f*-8 to *f*-11. Set the shutter speed to about 5 seconds. And set the focus to the distance to the steel wool spinner. (Set the camera to record in RAW format for the widest range of post-processing options?

- 4. Tie a 3' length of string securely to the steel wool. (This can vary depending on the height of the person twirling the steel wool, the angle of the spin, etc.)
- 5. Set the steel wool on fire and have someone swing it in a circle—over their head, in front of them, to their side, wherever.
- 6. Once the steel wool is in full swing, take the shot using the remote switch.

Photo History

The first photograph that included a recognizable human form was *Boulevard du Temple* taken by Louis Daguerre in 1838 in Paris. Due to the long exposure, moving objects didn't get recorded, but a man getting his shoes shined sat still long enough to be captured on the glass plate.



Defringing

If you see those nasty pink, purple, blue, or green lines around the edges of your image, especially visible sometimes after you apply post-processing, you may be able to get rid of them with just one click (especially if it's a Raw image). Here's how:




In **Lightroom** go to the **Lens Corrections panel** and click on the **Remove Chromatic Aberration checkbox** (as shown above).





When you zoom in to 300%, you can see Chromatic Aberration problems in this image — the lines lines/ halos around the edges of the image.



Here's a close-up before/after from that same image with nothing more being done than turning on that one checkbox.



In **Adobe Camera RAW** go to the **Optics panel** and open the **Defringe** section. Click on the eyedropper icon and then on the fringe (in the image) you want to remove.



Eagles in Winter

Denise Ippolito's "A Creative Adventure" is offering another trip to Alaska to photograph eagles in the snow and other wildlife and scenery. The trip begins in Homer, Alaska, and will be going out to Katchemak Bay and surrounding areas each day, via boat, to shoot these majestic birds in their natural environment. There will either be two 2-hour boat trips or one 4-hour boat trip daily, depending on weather, tides, and local conditions.

This trip will be led by ACreative Adventure tour leader Donna Bourdon. It includes photo instruction; a short informal meet & greet with slide program to get you acquainted with conditions, camera settings, etc.; all boat fees and boat-related expenses (excluding tips); ground transportation to the dock and back to the hotel each day; and five full days of photography from either the boat or on land.
