• October 14th—*My Favorite Image* You'll probably have to open up your archives for this assignment, Pack your absolutely favorite image to share. Beprepared & explain the who, what, where, when, why, and how of this photo. Entry deadline: October 12th.



• October 28th—*Theme Night:* (*B&W*) There's more than one way to skin a cat and to change an image to black-and-white. Show us what you can do in monochrome. Limit of 10 images, please. Entry deadline: October 26th.

• November 11th—You Be the Judge (Architecture) You may submit one architectural image that has never before been seen at any Club adrivities [Dinay be an office building or just a detail shot. Each entry will be scored and commented on by all participating Park West members. Entry deadline: October 15th.

• January 27th—*Theme Night:* (*Street Photography*) Share up to 10 of your images that feature chance encounters and random incidents on the street. Entry deadline: January 25th.



• February 10th—*Theme Night:* (*Planes, Trains, and Automobiles*) Share up to 10 of your mages where "planes, trains, and/or automobiles" are the main theme. Choose one form of transport or you may mix and match Entry deadline: February 8th.

February 24th—*Portfolio Night:* (*Dealer's Choice*) Submit from 6 to 10 images on a theme of your choice (humor, Covid, travel, etc.). Entry deadline: February 22nd. • March 10th—*Interpretations* The Club will provide the base images. The members will alter them in any way they see fit. Let your imagination and software skills be limitless. Entry deadline: March 8th.



• March 24th—*You Be the Judge (Food)* You may submit one image pertaining to the culinary arts that has never before been securat any Club activities. You are only limited by your appetite! Each entry will be scored and commented on by all participating Club members. Entry deadline: February 25th.

• June 9th—*Theme Night:* (*After Dark*) Astrophotography, traffic, street lights—endless possibilities—as long as your 10 submissions were shot after the sun has set. Entry deadline: June 7th.

PDI Workshops

Projected Digital Image workshops are held throughout the year—usually on Thursday evenings. There will also be a PDI workshop on Monday, April 28th. All entry deadlines are the previous day.

Year-End Competition

The Year-End Competition will be held on Monday, June 2nd. It's different from our monthly competitions: both the rules of entry and the judging are different.

Each Club member may submit up to four PDIs. But, and this is a big BUT—all the submissions must have been entered into one of the monthly competitions held earlier this year (October through May). It doesn't matter if the images were awarded honors or got a 'C'— they are eligible for this competition. Another big BUT—images may not be altered from the way they were first entered even if the judge said "that would improve the photo" —it must be the original, unaltered image with the same title (including the original month of entry). Absolutely no changes!!!

The image submission deadline is 11:59 p.m. on Monday, May 19th.

There will be three judges. Each of the judges will score from one to nine points for each image. The scores will be added and the total will be announced. An image can accumulate from 3 to 27 points. The judges make no comments during the scoring.

There will be one winner (the PDI-of-the-Year) plus four runners-up. If there are tie scores for the PDI-of-the-Year there will be additional votes cast by the judges to determine the winner. If more than four images are tied for runner-up, they will all be declared runners-up.

Due to the uncertainties of Zooming, the judging will be done prior to the June 2nd date. This way we can edit the recording for time and glitches.

Nomination and Election Procedures

We began the Club's yearly election procedures at the March business meeting with appointing the Nominating Committee (Elayne Dix, Richard Gold, and Helen Pine).

They will present their slate of (at least) one nominee for each position on the Executive Committee (president, vice president, treasurer, corresponding/membership secretary, recording secretary, and two membersat-large) to the membership at the last meeting in April.



Any Club member who is interested in running for an office may contact the Nominating Committee of their intent.

After the Nominating Committee's slate has been announced, the floor will be opened to nominations. Any Park West member may nominate any other Club member. Nominations will be accepted from the floor at each Club meeting leading up to, but not including, the May business meeting.

The next phase of the PWCC election process is the election itself. This takes place at the May business meeting. If there is only one nominee for each position, then a motion may be made asking the Club's recording secretary to cast a single unanimous vote for the slate. Should there be more than one nominee for any of the seven positions, then a vote must be taken for that position (those positions). The secretary can still cast the unanimous vote for the unopposed candidates.

Members must be present at the meeting to cast their vote.



Ken Hoffman





Assignment Details

Assignment #1	<u>Earth</u>	photograph parts of the solid earth—natural or man-made; mountains, deserts, grasslands, whatever; be creative
Assignment #2	<u>Water</u>	photograph parts of the liquid earth—oceans, rivers, rain; frozen (ice) or liquid (flowing or still), your choice; use differing techniques
Assignment #3	<u>Air</u>	photograph parts of the gaseous earth—atmospheric phenomena, clouds, storms, smog, anything that you can capture; use different focal lengths
Assignment #4	Fire	photograph things on fire or that are burning—candles, embers and ashes, matches; anything aflame or glowing
Term Project	Bugs	there are over 1,000,000 species of bugs—insects, spiders, centi-and milli- pedes, etc. on our planet; They may be found in and on the earth, the water, and the air, and they are attracted to fire and light; shoot whatever you can find using close-up or macro equipment



Constitution Amendment – Dissolution

After much discussion, the Club's Executive Committee has come up with a proposed amendment to the nearly ninety-year-old *Park West Camera Club Constitution*. The subject of this amendment is the dissolution of the Club.

Don't worry! The Club is not considering dissolution. We are still a vital, exciting, and strong organization. We are, however, aware of what has happened to many other camera clubs since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic they have failed and gone out of existence.

According to our current Constitution, a proposed amendment must first be presented to the membership at a business meeting (it was, on March 31st), published in *Photo Notes* (it is, you are reading it now), and then discussed and voted upon at the next business meeting (it will be, on May 19th).

Here is the wording of the proposed amendment...

Article XII Club Dissolution

Sec. 1 Should at any time a majority of the Executive Committee believe that the Park West Camera Club can no longer continue as a viable organization, they may approach the Club membership to discuss the dissolution of the Club.

Sec. 2 The motion to dissolve the Club shall be approved by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the membership at a meeting called for the sole purpose of the Club's dissolution as long as a quorum of seventy five percent (75%) of all current Club members has voted. This vote will be taken via email.

Sec. 3 Upon dissolution, the Executive Committee shall be responsible for the paying of all outstanding liabilities of the Club. Any and all physical property of the Club must be sold, donated, or otherwise disposed. Any money remaining in the Club's treasury will then be donated to a photographyrelated organization.


April Presentation

David Day

The guest photographer at the Club's April 21st meeting was photographer, multimedia journalist, and documentary filmmaker, David Day. He has always been intrigued by the interplay of light, shadows, color, and form. This interest ultimately led David to the art of intentional camera movement photography.

After moving into ICM, David modified many of the commonly used techniques for application to the studio environment. His images are made from scenes consisting of colored wires, plant parts, tissue paper, newsprint, plastic bags, sticks, leaves, glass, and other found objects that are transparent and opaque.

A solid tripod that's on the lighter side will allow you to steady your camera and capture amazing photos in a wide range of situations. But don't forget to bring a smaller tripod (like the Gorilla Pod) to capture images at a different angle.

While not strictly necessary, it helps to have some extra light when you're shooting at night. A headlamp is a good choice because it leaves your hands free to operate your equipment.

In late 2021, PWCC launched its own Instagram page. Instagram—a social media platform that focuses on pictures more than words seemed a natural for a camera club. Our goal is to attract followers and, potentially, new members to join Park West.

Once selected you will see the topics that have been set up along with a button to *Create New Topic*. You can view the topics and all the posts. You may even post a comment of your own.


All signed-up members will receive an email notice when new posts have been added. (You can easily *opt out* from any of the forums.)

PDI Workshop

This month the Club's PDI (Projected Digital Image) Workshop was held on a Monday night, April 28th. Twelve Park West members submitted one or two images each for comments and some suggestions to improve their images using Photoshop. Over 20 PWCCers attended the meeting and contributed. Here are some of the images that we worked on...



Evelyne Appel's image of reflected autumn foliage needed some more "pop." Using the Adobe Camera Raw filter in Photoshop (Filter > Camera Raw Filter...) we increased the Saturation in the Color Panel. This caused some colors to be overexposed so we reduced the Highlights in the Light Panel. As the last step we added a slight Vignette in the Effects Panel.





Cathy Smith's image of some Canada Geese needed some repairs. We used the **Remove Tool** (nested under the **Spot Healing Brush** in the **Tool Bar**) to remove the cut-off birds on the left edge of the image was well as the uppermost goose. We then used the **Content Aware Move Tool** (same location) to move the floating goose to a better position; we also enlarged it a bit. Finally we used **Image > Adjustments > Shadows/Highlights...** to make the birds lighter and the water a tad darker.




This desert scene by Jeff Langford required only minor adjustments. We used the Adobe Camera Raw filter in Photoshop (Filter > Camera Raw Filter...) to lower the Yellow Slider and increase the Orange and Blue Sliders in the Color Mixer Panel. As the last step we used the Light Panel to increase the Contrast.



Michael Ianncci's triptych of girls at the lake did not "read" well. We used the **Rectangle Tool** to **Select** the left panel. We used **Edit > Stroke...** to add a 2 pixel border around the image and then went to **Edit > Transform > Flip Horizontal** to turn make it face the other way. We repeated this with the center panel. Next, we selected the right panel and added a 2 pixel border. Finally we lowered the exposure of the entire image by using an **Exposure Adjustment Layer**.





Although most of us liked Paul Grebanier's silhouetted image we thought it had too high of a **Contrast**. When we checked its **Histogram** we found several areas of both **Overexposure** and **Underexposure**. We used **Image > Adjustments > Shadows/ Highlights...** to adjust both the **Highlights** and **Shadows Sliders** to even things out.



Sonia Durante wanted to change the background of her image of the cougar. We tried several methods of selecting the subject but settled on **Select > Subject** and then went to **Select > Inverse**. Next we used the **Color Picker** in the **Tool Bar** to select the off-white background. We then chose a large **Brush** from the **Tool Bar** and painted over the black area in the background. We felt that the cat needed more space above its ear and below its chin. This was accomplished with the **Crop Tool** set to **Content-Aware Fill** and pulled up from the top and down from the bottom—about ¼" each. Once this was done we used **Edit > Sky Replacement...** to fill in the background.




We all loved Carlton Johnson's Halloween image of two guys in nun's costumes. But we felt that the cropped-off person on the left edge was distracting. We used the Remove Tool (nested under the **Spot Healing Brush** in the **Tool Bar**) to remove the arm and shoe. We used Image > Adjustments > Shadows/ Highlights... to get more details in the nuns' habits and make their sneakers stand out a bit more.





Olympic Trees by Dudley Slater had a heavy blue cast. We used the Adobe Camera Raw filter in Photoshop (**Filter > Camera Raw Filter...**) to lower the **Blues**, **Purples**, and **Magentas Sliders** all the way to the left. This removed the undesired color cast as as well as opened up the shadow areas in the image revealing more of the background details.

Mike Schleiff's slightly tinted image, *Shadows*, was highly admired by everyone. We thought that that a few lines in the upper openings should be removed, as well as the dark triangle in the lower right corner. We used the **Spot Healing Brush** in the **Tool Bar** to perform these actions.





Chuck Pine's *Getting Sloshed* was an interesting social comment that didn't need too much done to it. However, we thought it could use a little more space on the top of the image. We did this using the **Crop Tool** set to **Generative Expand**. (We first tried the **Crop Tool** set to **Content-Aware Fill**, but that didn't work too well.)



Ruth Yashpan shot these cute lion cubs on safari in Africa. We thought the image could be improved with a few changes. First we removed the branch that went across the face of the bottom cub up the the paw of the top cub using the **Remove Tool** in small increments. Next we used the **Crop Tool** to eliminate some of that tree trunk. The third thing we did was use **Select > Subject** to isolate the upper cub and then we applied a **Brightness Contrast Adjustment Layer** to lighten it. Finally, we used a **Hue/Saturation Adjustment Layer** and reduced the **Yellow** and **Green Sliders** to make the foliage in the background less prominent.





The shot of the city's skyline by Hedy Klein had clouds that appeared noisy and blotchy. We tried using several noise reductions methods that didn't seem to work. In lieu of this, we used **Select > Subject** and then **Select > Inverse** so we could work on the sky. We then went to **Filter > Blur > Gaussian Blur...** to soften the clouds and make them less of a distraction.

Museums

Going to an art museum is many people's favorite pastime. When traveling, even more so. To be able to see these beautiful masterpieces, what a treat! It is such a privilege.

When you go to Paris you must visit the Louvre. How can you not? In 2007 the Louvre had a special exhibit of Gloria Friedman's *Les Contemporains* (The Contemporaries). These statues made of plaster and marble could have been called "Time Stops." So original, and so imaginative.

Pierre Aubert de Fontenay built his Hotel Salé in Paris in 1659 which became, in 1975, the Musée National Picasso. It is a favorite stop in the Marais section of Paris where I photographed this mother and her daughter having a very special moment with a Picasso painting.

Fondation Louis Vuitton, built in 2014, in the Bois de Boulogne in Paris, was designed by the Canadian-American architect Frank Gehry. It is such an exciting structure, a marvel, inviting many photographers.

The Fondation Maeght in St. Paul de Vence, in the south of France, houses the largest painting by Marc Chagall that I have ever seen. *La Vie* is thirteen feet wide. It is so

exhilarating, so colorful, by Evelyne Appel that it transports you to another world.

> In 2012 I went to Seattle where the Chihuly Garden and Glass had just opened. Dale Chihuly is probably the most famous glass sculptor in the world. I was mesmerized by his craft and artistry.

To visit a museum is good for the soul.








When setting white and black points, you can hold down the Alt/Option key to see any highlight or shadow clipping while moving the adjustment.



Weather Or Not

I know, I know! I used the wrong "whether" in this title.

Or did I?

Let me start again... When we go out, cameras in hand, whether it's street shooting, architectural photography, or to capture our favorite birds we want great lighting so our images will look their best.

But do we? Really?

Rain, snow, or mist can turn an ordinary photograph into a piece of art. They can infuse mood, texture, and drama into the composition. Weather conditions not only make the scene more dynamic but they also tend to emphasize the subject.

Being prepared (Yes, I was a Boy Scout!) is critical when photographing in any kind of precipitation. Safeguard your gear using a rain cover or waterproof housing. Carry a towel to wipe off your gear often. And be sure to dress for the weather conditions.

Don't forget to be creative in your shooting. A fast shutter speed can freeze the motion in the frame, while a slow shutter speed can create artistic streaks. Since this kind of weather usually means low levels of light, a tripod is not a bad idea. Or, don't be afraid to raise the ISO to achieve the images you're looking for.



A good rain cover will allow you to keep shooting even when the weather doesn't cooperate with your plans.

Tariffs and Photo Gear



All photography equipment not made in the US (which is most of it) will be much more expensive in the near future! The three big brands— Canon, Sony, and Nikon —are based in Japan. Nikon and Sony have shifted much of their camera and lens making to Thailand and China. Canon makes some of its lower-end equipment in Taiwan, too, but it also manufactures in Japan.

Products from Japan will have a tariff rate of 24%, while products manufactured in Taiwan and Thailand face a 32% and 36% tariff increase, respectively. China is facing a 125% tariff.

All three companies are seriously considering shifting facilities back to Japan (or to other low-tax countries).

How will this affect prices here in the US? Expect all gear to increase drastically. Is there anything we can do to offset these price increases? You can consider holding onto your current gear longer or buying used gear instead of new.


UV Filters



Digital cameras aren't sensitive to UV (ultraviolet) light, but UV filters still have some uses...

- Protection—from dust, water sprays, scratches, and sand.
- Creativity—smear some Vaseline, gel, or wax on your UV filter to create soft focus effects.
- Low Contrast—on overcast or lowlight days UV filters can boost the contrast of photos.



Cameras and Heat

Recognizing the signs of overheating can help you take preventive measures before any serious damage occurs. Look out for:

- Warning Messages: Modern cameras display a warning message if they detect high levels of heat.
- Shutdowns: If your camera shuts down unexpectedly, it could be due to its overheating.



- Slow Performance:
 Overheating can
 cause the camera to
 slow down or lag.
- Hot to the Touch: If the camera body feels unusually hot, it's a clear sign that it's overheating.

Cameras and Heat

All digital cameras—DSLRs, mirrorless, or compact—are designed to operate within a specific temperature range. Typically, this range falls is between 32°F and 104°F (0°C to 40°C). Exceeding these limits, especially on the upper end, can lead to several issues:

• **Overheating:** Prolonged exposure to high temps can cause the camera to



overheat. This can result in automatic shutdowns to prevent damage to its internal components.

• Sensor Damage: Image sensors are particularly sensitive to heat. Long

periods in hot conditions can lead to permanent damage, thus affecting image quality.

- **Battery Drain:** Batteries tend to drain faster in extreme heat, reducing the time you can shoot.
- Warping and Melting: In severe cases, high temperatures can cause the plastic components of your camera to warp or even melt.

Easter Eggs

Photoshop has some hidden goodies known as Easter Eggs. They're not as tasty as chocolate Easter Eggs, but here are a couple you may want to check out...

In the Photoshop Menu Bar, click on Photoshop > Settings... > Interface..., then hold down Command-Option-Shift (on a Mac) or Control-Alt-Shift (on a PC) and click on the swatch beside Color Theme. Keep clicking to toggle between normal, toast, and coffee.

At the bottom of the **Toolbar** (usually on the left of the screen), click and hold down the **three dots** (\cdots) to edit the toolbar. When the edit box opens up, hold down Shift and click Done. Voila, you have a banana in the toolbar. To remove it, go back into editing the toolbar and this time hold down the Command (Mac) / Control (PC) key while clicking **Done**.

Pet Photo Tips

- You capture their image from their level.

The Nikon Z5 II Mirrorless Camera upgrades its predecessor with a 25.4MP full-frame sensor, shooting speeds of up to 30 fps, automatic detection of nine unique subjects, and low-light capabilities with up to 7.5 stops of built-in image stabilization. It's being sold in three kits: as a body only for \$1,696.95; with a 24-50mm *f*-4-6.3 Lens for \$1,996.95; or with a 24-200mm *f*-4-6.3 Lens for \$2,496.95.

Newest G Master Lens



Sony recently announced their FE 50-150mm *f*-2 GM lens for their E-mount camera bodies. This fast zoom, with a unique focal range, is for portraiture, wedding, event, and and closerange sports applications. The lens does come with some heft —at almost 8 inches and 3 pounds—but it's declickable aperture ring, programmable focus hold buttons, and a focus mode switch add controls to the lens body. All this for a heavy price of \$3,898.

Fast Normal Lens



The Zeiss Otus ML *f*-1.4/50 lens is crafted for those who live to tell stories. Inspired by the legendary Otus family, the new lens bring Zeiss' optical excellence to mirrorless system cameras (available for Sony E-Mount, Canon RF-Mount and Nikon Z-Mount). Are you seated? All three models are going for \$2,499 (each). All-in-One Zoom Lens



Coming later this summer, a zoom that lets you shoot from ultra-telephoto to wide-angle, without changing lenses. The Tamron 18-300mm *f*-3.5-6.3 Di III-A VC VXD is an all-in-one zoom lens for Nikon Z-mount and Canon RF-mount APS-C mirrorless cameras. (It's already available for Fujifilm X-mount and Sony E-mount.) Each model is going/will go for a mere \$699.

Wide-Angle Action



The Insta360 X5 can perform as both a 360° camera and wideangle action camera thanks to dual- and single-lens modes. Its AI PureShot processes 72MP photos for images you can share on social media and its creative video modes like Bullet Time, Me Mode, and TimeShift are built in to the camera's interface. All this for a cost of \$549.99.

Sharpening and Noise Reduction:

enhance image details and reduce noise in high ISO images. They are in the Detail Panel.

Lens Corrections:

a built-in database of lens profiles that can automatically correct common lens issues such as distortion and chromatic aberration.

Graduated and Radial Filters:

these allow you to add adjustments selectively to specific areas of your image. Radial filters work well for isolating subjects and creating vignettes. Graduated filters are used to balance skies and foregrounds in landscapes.

Spot Removal:

perfect for getting rid of sensor dust, small blemishes, and other unwanted elements in images. Choose among Clone and Heal modes, depending on the effect.



Using Your Camera by Chuck Pine

Aperture and DoF

When shooting an outdoor portrait, for example, you have three settings which you can control to get a good exposure and the best possible image. They are the camera's ISO and shutter speed, and the aperture of the lens.

Your ISO should stay low to prevent noise! ISO 100 should do on most sunny days. Bumping it up to 200 or even 400 may be necessary on overcast days or when it's dark like around sunrise or sunset.

Your shutter speed should be set at 1/125s or above. This will prevent camera shake from affecting the shot. Of course, if you're going for some creative blur in your image, you may go lower (or if your camera or lens is stabilized).

The aperture (also called the *f*-stop) setting lets you get creative. Experiment with using different apertures—that way you can create everything from beautiful blurred backgrounds to those that are sharp and emphasize the color and texture of the scene.



Photographed at f2.8 to get a blurry background

To get a blurry background, set your aperture to its widest opening (i.e., the lowest *f*-stop, such as *f*-4, *f*-2.8, *f*-1.8, etc.).



Photographed at f8 to bring more of the background in

If you want greater detail in the background, try focusing on your subject but increasing the aperture to *f*-8 or *f*-11.



Photographed at f22 which further brings in background detail. Shutter speed did drop so ISO was increased.

And to get everything in focus, from the subject in the foreground to the background, increase the aperture to *f*-16 or even *f*-22. Just be mindful that when shooting at these very small apertures your shutter speed will be much lower so you'll probably need to increase your ISO.

Lr/ACR Tools

Tone Curve:

allows you to precisely adjust the tonal range of an image. You can control highlights, shadows, and midtones to create the desired contrast and tonal balance.

Basic Panel:

controls for Exposure, Contrast, Highlights, Shadows, Whites, and Blacks. These sliders let you adjust brightness, contrast, and the tonal balance of your images.

HSL / Color Panel:

allows you to adjust the Hue, Saturation, and Luminance for individual colors. This is useful for enhancing specific colors or correcting color imbalances in photos.

Waterfall Photography

Waterfall photography is a genre that captivates many with its beauty and dynamic compositions. One of the ageold debates when shooting waterfalls is whether to use a fast or a slow shutter speed. Both approaches can produce great results. Here are some advantages and disadvantages of each shooting style.... Freezing motion offers a more "realistic" portrayal of the scene as our eyes see it. High

• Fligh shutter

speeds can prevent overexposure from happening. *Disadvantages*:

• If not executed well, the



Fast Shutter Speeds

Using a fast shutter speed means that the camera's sensor is exposed to light for a very brief period of time. This is usually 1/125 of a second or faster and tends to freeze any motion in the scene. *Advantages*:

• A fast shutter can freeze every droplet, allowing for a detailed capture of the water's texture and motion. d well, the photo can feel lifeless or static, lacking the motion and energy of a waterfall.

• Compensate for the lower light from the faster shutter, you must up the ISO, which can add noise to the photo.

Slow Shutter Speeds

When photographers use slow shutter speeds for waterfalls, the camera sensor is exposed to light for an extended period of time. This is usually 1/15 of a second or slower and tends to blur any motion present in the scene.

Advantages:

• The prolonged exposure creates a cotton candy or



silky effect in the moving water, often evoking a dreamy, surreal atmosphere.

- This method can add mood such as tranquility, majesty, or mystery.
- With a slower shutter, there is more light reaching the sensor, letting you use a lower ISO, which yields images with less noise.
- Disadvantages:
 - The slow shutter speed will smooth out the textures and details in the water.

 In bright conditions, there's a risk of overexposing parts of the photo, which can blow out details in the highlight areas.

 Achieving a sharp photo with a slow shutter speed requires the use of a tripod or other equipment.

My suggestion is to always shoot waterfalls with both fast and slow shutter speeds and then choose your favorites.

Photo Printing Paper

Printing fine art photos is more than just clicking "print." It's an art form, requiring the perfect marriage between paper, ink, and vision. The right photo paper changes a digital masterpiece into a tangible work of art, which amplifies colors, textures, and emotions. But with a dizzying array of choices, how do you know which paper will do your image justice? Here's how to start...

First off, you have to decide what kind of paper to use. There are basically four kinds of photo paper:

• Matte—a smooth, nonreflective surface that eliminates glare; a top choice for portraits; best when images are displayed behind glass or plastic

- Glossy—delivers deep blacks, vibrant colors, and a rich finish that enhances sharpness and contrast; best for high-impact, highcontrast photography
- Luster—between matte and glossy, it offers the best of both worlds—rich color depth with just a hint of sheen; it's durable and resists fingerprints
- Specialty—many kinds exist but most popular are metallic and textured papers Some things to consider when choosing a photo paper are...
- Paper Size—will it show off your image the best? Will it fit your printer?
- Paper Weight—a heavier paper feels more luxurious and holds up well over time but is more expensive and might jam in some printers
- Brightness and Whiteness higher brightness levels make colors more vivid; warmer (off-white) tones

- give images a softer, vintage feel
- Archival Quality—archival papers are acid-free, ligninfree, and designed to resist yellowing and deterioration over time

Not all papers are created equally. Your best bet is to look for well-known brands like Hahnemuhle Canon, Moab, and Epson.



Creating Snow


Winter has come and gone. Spring has sprung. But images with falling snow are not out of the question. Here's a fairly simple way to add snow to an image without combining images or using a preset.



Open an image and create a new blank layer by going to **Layer > New > Layer...** and click **OK**.

Fill this new layer with black by going to **Edit > Fill...** and set **Contents** to **Black**, **Mode** to **Normal**, and **Opacity** to **100**%.

Next, go to **Filter > Noise > Add Noise....** The **Amount** of the noise should depend on your preference—smaller grains for the background, larger for the foreground. [*I used 300*] The image will now look like this... [*see center column, above*]



Go to **Filter > Filter Gallery**... > **Dry Brush** and click **OK**. [*experiment with other filters*]

Change the layer's **Blend Mode** to **Screen**. There will be white snowflakes on top of the image.



Head back to the **Filter Menu**. Add a **Gaussian Blur** by going to **Filter > Blur > Gaussian Blur...** Use a **Pixel Radius** of between **3** and **4**. [*I used 3.5*]

Next add a **Motion Blur** using **Filter > Blur > Motion Blur**.... Angle the blur's **Direction** to be vertical, or near vertical. Finally, choose a **Blend Mode** that makes the image look its best. [*I chose Darker Color for this image*]

Histogram:

provides a visual representation of tonal ranges in images. It helps assess exposures and make adjustments as needed.

Crop and Straighten:

allows you to trim your image to a desired aspect ratio, and enables you to correct any slanted lines, such as horizons.

White Balance:

essential for correcting color temperature in your images. You can use the eyedropper tool to select a neutral area or make manual adjustments using temperature and tint sliders.

Park West Camera Club meets just about every Monday night (with some exceptions for a few holidays and a shortened summer schedule).




Headshot Tips
